- 1) The BAS is a publication of the Association for Asian Studies. You may find the logo of the AAS, as well as the pictorial graphic used for the BAS, at this web page: <http://www.asian-studies.org/Publications/BAS>
- 2) The BAS itself is a world-class bibliographic database of international repute, and with hundreds of subscribing institutions all over the world. Our relationship with EBSCO is that EBSCO the BAS through their online database provision and user interface.
- 3) There is no formal linkage of BAS with the other directories that you mention, as far as I am aware.
- 4) I am not sure I understand this question. The inclusion of the GRR in the BAS is highlighted by the inclusion of this title in our browsable and searchable master list of included journal from about all of Asia). Of course, the individual articles from the GRR will come up in the result sets when our users do searches or browses on the BAS database.
- 5) The BAS platform is valued by our users because it provides article-level bibliographic discovery (and linkage to online full-text where available) for hundreds of thousands of materials, any other source in print or online. These include chapter-level indexing of edited volumes, conference proceedings, festschriften, etc., as well as the journals we include. The integrated co rich discovery and research support features makes the BAS the single most valuable for research on all aspects of Asian studies, at all levels from undergraduate to post-graduate advancement.
